

Identification Guide

The New Zealand Firefighters Credit Union must comply with the Anti-Money Laundering and Countering Financing of Terrorism Act 2009 ("the Act") which came into effect on 30 June 2013.

All Banks and Credit Unions across New Zealand need to ensure that they comply with the Act.

This means we need to collect extra information to show that we have identified you and any persons acting on your behalf regardless of whether you are a new member or have been with us for many years.

Identification can be verified either Electronically or by Certification.

If the Electronic Identity Verification (Option 1) is not successful, we will contact you to provide Certified Identity Documents (Option 2).

Option 1: Electronic Identity Verification

By supplying us with your Driver's Licence and Proof of Address, you consent to us verifying your identity electronically against external data sources. We do this by providing your details securely to third parties which specialises in electronic identity verification. Your details will not used for any other purpose.

Please provide the following

Photo
Identification

A copy of your current NZ Driver Licence

PLUS

Proof of Address

We also need a copy of any one of the following documents that must display your name and physical address and be no more than 12 months old:

- A recent bill from your power / gas / water/ telephone or internet service provider
- A council rates notice or valuation notice
- A statement from any NZ Bank
- An insurance policy
- A letter from the Electoral Office
- A Government Agency issued item which includes your name, address and unique reference identifier
- A letter from your solicitor confirming a recent house purchase
- A tenancy agreement

Option 1: Electronic Identity Verification (continued)

How do I provide my Driver Licence and Proof of Address to the New Zealand Firefighters Credit Union for electronic verification?

Step 1

Take a photo of your Driver licence – it's easiest to use the camera on your phone

(Please copy both sides of your licence).




Step 2

Take a selfie of yourself with both your face and your driver licence clearly visible in the photo.

Watch out where you put your fingers, don't accidentally obscure any part of your driver licence.

If your selfie skills are not ideal ask a colleague to take the photo for you.



Step 3

Take a photo of your "Proof of Address".

- We need to see:
- 1. The name of the issuer
- 2. Your name
- 3. Your address
- The date of the document which cannot be older than 12 months.



Step 4

Email all the images to us at nzfcu@firefighters.co.nz



Step 5

We will electronically verify your identity documentation. In the event we are unable to do so, we will contact you to discuss other options.

Option 2: Certified Identification

Please provide the following:

Photo Identification

Any one of the following which must be CURRENT and must be CERTIFIED as detailed overleaf:

- NZ Driver Licence
 Please copy both sides of your
 licence before having it certified
- NZ Passport
- NZ Certificate of Identity
- NZ Firearms Licence
- Overseas passport

OR

Non-Photo Identification

Any one of the following which <u>must be</u> <u>CERTIFIED</u> as detailed overleaf:

- Full NZ birth certificate
- Certificate of NZ Citizenship
- Birth certificate issued by a foreign government

AND

Any one of the following which must be CURRENT and must be CERTIFIED as detailed overleaf:

- 18+ card (Hospitality Association)
- A valid and current international driving permit
- Student Identification

PLUS

Proof of Address

We also need a copy of any one of the following documents that must display your name and physical address and be no more than 12 months old and <u>must be CERTIFIED</u> as detailed overleaf:

- A recent bill from your power / gas / water/ telephone or internet service provider
- A council rates notice or valuation notice
- A statement from any NZ Bank
- An insurance policy
- A letter from the Electoral Office
- A Government Agency issued item which includes your name, address and unique reference identifier
- A letter from your solicitor confirming a recent house purchase
- A tenancy agreement

Option 2: Certified Identification (continued)

Document Certification

- 1. You must take your original documents plus a copy to your certifier (or in person to the Credit Union).
- 2. The certifier must sight the original documentation in your presence and certify the copy(s) as detailed below.
- 3. The certified copy(s) must then be mailed to New Zealand Firefighters Credit Union at: P O Box 33 097, Petone, Lower Hutt 5046

We regret they **CANNOT BE FAXED OR SCANNED AND EMAILED**. (While the documents can be copies, the signature of the certifier must be original).

Who can be an Authorised Certifier?

The Authorised Certifier Must:

Be at least 16 years of age and one of the following:

- Member of the Police
- Justice of the Peace
- Registered medical doctor
- Registered teacher
- Lawyer

The Authorised Certifier Cannot:

- be related to the Applicant
- be the spouse or partner of the Applicant
- live at the same address as the Applicant
- be a person involved in the transaction or account or entity requiring certification

What must an Authorised Certifier do?

Certification Statement

The Authorised Certifier must write the following statement on each copy of the original document:

"I certify that this document was presented to me by {the named individual} and is a true copy and represents the identity of {the named individual}"

Provide Their Details

The Authorised Certifier must write the following on each copy of the original document:

- their name
- their occupation
- their daytime contact number
- the date they certified your document (The document must be dated and provided to the Credit Union within 3 months of it being certified)

along with their signature on each copy of the original document.

When certification occurs overseas, the trusted referee certifying the document/s must be a person authorised by law in that country to take statutory declarations or the equivalent in the Applicant's country.
